#### **Religious Education Curriculum Aims**

- To develop knowledge and understanding of different beliefs and practices, including festivals, worship, rituals and ways of life, in order to find out about the meanings behind them and make connections between different features of the religions.
- Expressing ideas and insights by asking and responding to questions about what individuals and communities do, and why, so that pupils can identify what difference belonging to a community might make. Observe and understand varied examples of religions and world views so that they can explain, with reasons, their meanings and significance to individuals and communities.
- Gaining and deploying skills Explore questions about <u>belonging, meaning and truth</u> so that they can express ideas and opinions in response using words, music, art or poetry. Discuss and present thoughtfully their own and others' views on challenging questions about belonging, meaning, purpose and truth, applying ideas of their own in different forms including reasoning, music, art and poetry.

#### **EYFS and RE**

Understanding of the world educational programme (taken from the EYFS Framework 2020)

Understanding the world involves guiding children to make sense of their physical world and their community. The frequency and range of children's personal experiences increases their knowledge and sense of the world around them – from visiting parks, libraries and museums to meeting important members of society such as police officers, nurses and firefighters. In addition, listening to a broad selection of stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems will foster their understanding of our culturally, socially, technologically and ecologically diverse world. As well as building important knowledge, this extends their familiarity with words that support understanding across domains. Enriching and widening children's vocabulary will support later reading comprehension.



# Transition to KS1

Through our bespoke curriculum, Reception children are gently introduced to the world around them by exploring significant events that are meaningful to them and others. They begin by reflecting on what makes them unique, as well as special times shared with their families and friends. Children are encouraged to think about significant events from the past, helping them understand how these moments shape our lives. The concept of celebration is explored, teaching children why certain occasions are important to others and how they are celebrated in different ways. They also learn to appreciate the similarities and differences between various religions within our community and country, fostering an early understanding of diversity and respect for others. This holistic approach helps children develop a broader perspective of the world and the people in it.
